Some ten years ago, with Istanbul pals Nick Hobbs and Suha Ulgen, I was a co-founder of *HikingIstanbul*—a project to create a network of c.20km day-hikes in Istanbul's hinterland. My task of late has been to write short essays on the some 60 villages and suburbs we have hiked through, and also the points of interest we chanced upon. One of the most intriguing of the latter is the ruined church at former Belgrad village, deep in the Beograd Ormanı (photo here).

We seem to be ignorant of when it was built, and by whom, and how and whether it changed hands between different faiths over time. François Vuccino, age 75, passed away in the early hours of 10th June 2022 after a courageous battle with cancer.

François was born on 16th May, 1947 in Istanbul. Son of Raul and Nazime Vuccino and brother of Andrée Vuccino Hürcan. His mother Nazime was also known as the granddaughter of Bozcaadalı Hasan Hüsnü Pasha, Ottoman Admiral (1832 -1903). François went to Saint Michelle French school and was married to Eleni Katsikadelli.





Reflection



Quentin Compton-Bishop, Chairman of LHF on Commemorating Smyrna 1922

The 100th anniversary of the tragic destruction of much of Smyrna in 1922 is a time to reflect on how that event affected the local Levantine community. It is also an opportunity for the Levantine Heritage Foundation, on its 12th anniversary, to take stock of what it has achieved to record, share and preserve the heritage and culture of the Levant.

The 1922 fire was a disaster for the city and most of its citizens. It might be considered as the critical event that triggered the diaspora of Levantines from the region. While that is largely true for Smyrna Levantines, the migration of Levantines from their established eastern Mediterranean homes to other cities and countries had started even before the First World War.

While Levantine cities were still experiencing a golden age, regional instability and insecurity caused some Levantines to seek new opportunities elsewhere. Some moved to other eastern Mediterranean cities. Others sought to make a living further afield in Asia, Africa, Australasia and the Americas. But 1922 turned a trickle into a flood.

The 1922 tragedy and the break-up of the Smyrna Levantine community was not the *raison d'être* for the LHF, however. The LHF's focus is on remembering and preserving the heritage and culture of the interwoven families, communities and cities of the Levant as a whole.

Smyrna, now Izmir, provided the stimulus for the foundation of the LHF in 2010. Years before, our Founder, Craig Encer, had started to assemble on his website the recollections, writings and records of Levantines and the corresponding academic community. But "Izmir 2010" galvanized others to support Craig and to expand and sustain his great project.

Izmir 2010 for the LHF means the symposium "Levantines – From the Past to the Present" held with the generous support of the Izmir Chamber of Commerce. Delegates came from across the world: descendants of Levantine families and academics from Turkish and international institutions. The event demonstrated the model the LHF strives to develop: a symbiotic community of academic and independent researchers and family historians and enthusiasts sharing their knowledge and making it available to a global public. The LHF's mission is to further research, advance education and to preserve the heritage, arts and culture of the past and present Levantine communities.

So, how should the LHF commemorate its progress in the context of Smyrna 1922 and Izmir 2010? Smyrna 1922 underlines how quickly and catastrophically rich physical, cultural and social heritage can be lost. Izmir 2010 marks the LHF's effort to redress the losses that occur over time and in signal events such as war and the passing of members of the community. We try to prevent the loss of their personal memories and, sadly, too often the disposal of their memorabilia like books, photographs, and pictures. While these are often not valued by some of the next generation in the family, they do hold a value for a wider Levantine community.

The LHF has started to stem the tide of losses. Its website is the premier reference destination for Levantine researchers and often used by academics, publishers and documentary makers for source material. Over 12 years, we have organized major international conferences in Istanbul, London and Athens, 35 smaller events and 20 Zoom talks. The website continues to develop and expand. The LHF's network numbers over 1,500 people around the world.

This has been achieved through a handful of loyal volunteers and trustees and with Craig Encer still at the heart of the organization and master of the LHF website. Of course, there is more we want to do: develop multilingual websites, create a digital archive, establish a physical archive in a Levantine building. We receive no grants and rely on subscriptions, donations and sponsorship.
