Request for information by Ann Hudson on Samuel Crawley, British Consul at Smyrna 1742-62.

Having written the article on my ancestor Samuel Crawley for the Oxford Dictionary of National Biography (<u>https://doi.org/10.1093/ref:odnb/109573</u>), I am now working on a more detailed biography, particularly featuring his time in Smyrna and his family. He married Marie Dunant, from Constantinople, who after his death married the Dutch Consul, Daniel Jean, Comte de Hochepied. Several of the children of both marriages intermarried with other prominent Smyrna families. I have information from the Levant Company archives in the National Archives, from the Dutch State Archives, and from many other printed and manuscript sources including the documents on the Levantine Heritage website, and I have visited the old Dutch graveyard in Izmir. Request for information by John Birchenough on the involvement of the Peacock family with the Smyrna Cassaba Railway

Recently I discovered an unexpected family connection between my great great grandfather Richard Peacock, MP and locomotive manufacturer and the city of Smyrna. Following the chance find of a reference to a 'half cousin' living in Smyrna in the 1928 will of Richard's eldest son, I cross-checked this with a family bible and other sources including the Levantine Foundation website. The picture evolved of an extended family with interests that stretched from the early years of railway construction in Leeds to locomotive manufacturing in Manchester and the Smyrna to Cassaba Railway. If anyone else has additional information to add on the involvement of the Peacock family with the Smyrna Cassaba Railway I would be interested in hearing from them. Request for information by Dr Sumner Braund on the provenance of astrolabes via two Parisian antiques dealerships, owned and operated by Ottoman emigrants

I am the Curator of Founding Collections at the History of Science Museum in Oxford. I have been working to reconstruct the full provenance history of the Lewis Evans Collection of scientific instruments, donated to the university in 1924. This has proven a fascinating, winding endeavour and I am writing to ask for your help and insights in regards to two dealers from whom Lewis Evans purchased five astrolabes.


The History of Science Museum at the University of Oxford holds a globally significant collection of medieval and early modern astrolabes and celestial globes. These exquisite astronomical instruments are a testament to the historic interconnectedness of science, art, and belief across cultures.


A significant number of these instruments were collected in the late 19th and early 20th century by an English businessman and independent scholar, Lewis Evans. He purchased medieval and early modern astrolabes and celestial globes from art and antiques dealers based in the prominent cities of Europe. He was a lifelong collector and acquired the majority of his collection in London and Paris.

Two Parisian antiques dealerships, owned and operated by Ottoman emigrants, are the focus of my current research, that of the Akchoté brothers and that of Vitali Franses. Between 1911 and 1913, the Akchoté brothers and Vitali Franses sold a total of five astrolabes to Lewis Evans. Astrolabes and celestial globes, of any origin, were rare and sought-after antiques (albeit by a select group of collectors) at the turn of the century. By this time, the Akchoté brothers and Vitali Franses, a second dealership in Algiers.

Solomon Akchoté, along with two of his brothers (Jacob and Isaac), and Vitali Franses successfully applied to become naturalised French citizens after the first World War. Their naturalisation case papers, held in the Archives Nationales in Paris, reveal that they were Ottoman Jews, born in Constantinople. These case papers have provided a valuable insight into certain aspects of their lives, including for example their wives' place of birth and the place and date of their marriages. It is clear from these details that the Akchoté brothers and Vitali Franses maintained strong ties to Constantinople after emigrating to Paris: their parents remained in Constantinople and they all, with the exception of Solomon, returned to the city to marry.

I am interested in further reconstructing the transnational familial, social and business networks of which these antiques dealers were a part. The case papers in the Archives Nationales and Parisian census data have provided wonderful insights, and I would be grateful to anyone who is able to point me in the direction of other archives or resources. We would like to inform you about the next initiative of the Association Levanten Kültür ve Mirasını Koruma Derneği (LKMKD), the 'Levantines of Istanbul, Istanbul of Levantines' Exhibition that will take place in the second quarter of year 2026 in the district of Beyoğlu / Pera.

This exhibition will showcase the Levantine community's cultural, social, and economic impact between 1850 and 1950, offering the first holistic narrative of its heritage. The exhibition will highlight key contributions to the community in the fields such as architecture, art, commerce, and diplomacy, culminating in a meaningful historical story.

Our messages

The Levantine Heritage Library & Archive

The groundwork to identify a permanent physical location for the Levantine Heritage Library and Archive is underway. It is not a simple exercise as, in an ideal situation, we seek a location and space with Levantine connections, accessible to researchers and which is largely funded by benefactors and grants. In the event that we cannot achieve the ideal, the alternatives include finding a host-library for our collection and outsourcing digitisation work for the archive. We welcome the experience and advice of our readers in helping us shape a practical strategy and implementation plan.


Meanwhile, we invite to browse our online catalogue. It consists primarily of the Jacques Caporal Collection of books and genealogical records and we are adding other books donated or loaned as they become available.


To access the catalogue, just click on this link <u>Levantine Heritage Library</u> which has a search box. Type in a key word and a list of items tagged with that word will appear. Much of the collection is in French, so some keywords are French.

Jacques Caporal had a particular interest in the history of France and the Levant. This is reflected in the quantity and breadth of books in the Jacques Caporal Collection gifted to the Levantine Heritage Library in 2022. Over a third of the books relate to history (570+ items) and about half of those concern France and its overseas interests.

In 1535, Suleiman the Magnificent granted a "capitulation" to France conferring rights and privileges to French subjects resident in or trading with the Ottoman Empire. This capitulation was added to and updated in later years. These "ententes commerciales" helped France build a dominant position in the Levant trade up to the mid-18th century.

There are several volumes on the subject, one enigmatically written by "Un ancien diplomate" and published in 1898 (below). The "former diplomat" was in fact Gustave Cirilli (1848-1928), French Vice-Consul in Smyrna, and husband to Grace van Lennep, whose father, Richard Jacob van Lennep (1811-1890), was a Dutch Levantine and Consul-General of the Low Countries in Smyrna.





The regulations ("ordonnance") for the conduct of French diplomats in the key ports and cities ("échelles") of the Levant covered by the capitulations was first set out in the reign of Louis XIV (1638-1715). While France's Levant trade grew to its greatest extent in the 18th century, it began to decline for various political and commercial reasons.

In an attempt to protect it, the Ordonnance was revised in 1776 creating a more hierarchical structure of diplomatic posts in the échelles and placing certain strictures on commercial activities and introducing duties on the Levant trade. Following a review, the 1781 revision (above) established free trade, allowing foreign ships to trade between France and the échelles without paying a 20% tax. Not long afterwards, the Revolution proved very disruptive to France's Levant trade, to the benefit of the British in particular.
