Cairo through the lens of pilgrims and explorers from the Middle Ages to Napoleon

This talk shows how the image of Cairo and its Islamic architecture evolved in the perspective of travelogues from the Middle Ages to Bonaparte's Expedition. Although Antiquity and biblical associations were the main attractions of pre-modern travels to Egypt, medieval Cairo and its Islamic architecture attracted increasing interest over the centuries. The lecture documents with many and some rare illustrations the impact of Islamic Cairo in European travelogues and how it culminated in academic studies of Islamic art and architecture.
